Altino duo performs Brahms concerto with the Philharmonic Orchestra

March 6, 2020 (Columbus, Ind.) – The Columbus Indiana Philharmonic welcomes Korean violinist Soh-Hyun Park Altino and Brazilian cellist Leonardo Altino in a performance with the orchestra, Columbus Indiana Children's Choir and the Philharmonic Chorus on Saturday, March 28, 2020 at 7:30 p.m. The concert, titled "Forrest & Brahms" is cosponsored by Tilson HR and is the sixth in the orchestra's 2019-2020 season titled "We're Playing for You!" This season is brought to you by NTN Driveshaft and The Republic.



The performance will take place at First Christian Church, 531 5th Street, Columbus, IN 47201. Tickets are priced \$25 for adults and \$15 for youth/students. Unlike the orchestra's Erne Auditorium concerts, seats are not assigned at this concert; they are general admission (first-come, first-served). ABOUT THE CONCERT

Built on the Psalm 100 text, "O be joyful in the Lord, all ye lands," Dan Forrest's *Jubilate Deo!* is first on the program. Forrest's composition for chorale and orchestra employs seven different languages as well as the musical styles of cultures from around the world, bringing to life the global aspect of the traditional text. Commissioned by the Indianapolis Children's Choir, this 45-50 minute piece premiered in 2016.

Brahms' Double Concerto was his swan song to the orchestra. While integrating two solo instruments would present problems, Brahms appreciated the challenge, especially when it presented the opportunity to repair his friendship with violinist Joseph Joachim. When his estranged friend divorced, Brahms sided with the ex-wife, publicly supporting her in court, causing Joachim to sever professional and personal ties to the composer. Seven years later, the Double Concerto patched the quarrel, and Brahms conducted Joachim in the 1887 premiere.
