





About Isaac

A musician of remarkable versatility, ISAAC SELYA has extensive experience as a conductor, pianist, vocal coach, cellist and entrepreneur. He is the Music Director of the Columbus Indiana Philharmonic, and founder and Artistic Director of Queen City Opera, where he has led acclaimed performances that combine high-caliber classical music with contemporary relevance and community collaborations, including the following projects:

- » Mozart' Super Flute; a production of Mozart's Magic Flute set in the world of classic video games.
- » Reconstructing Tchaikovsky's lost Undina as an ecoopera focusing on sustainable energy production and water stewardship, presented in collaboration with Green Umbrella and the Cincinnati Nature Center.
- » Defiant Requiem: Verdi at Terezín, commemorating the musicians of the Terezín Concentration Camp who performed Verdi's Requiem as an act of defiance against the Nazis.
- » Beethoven's *Fidelio* in collaboration with Amnesty International and the Ohio Innocence Project.
- » The Ohio premiere of Tchaikovsky's *Iolanta* in collaboration with the Cincinnati Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired.

He is also a finalist for the Music Director search at Cincinnati Ballet, where he will conduct the Cincinnati Symphony in a performance of the *Wizard of Oz* in March 2025. He conducted the Los Angeles stage premiere of Tchaikovsky's *Iolanta* at Pacific Opera Project, in collaboration with the National Federation for the Blind, and with blind soprano Cristina Jones in the title role. He is one of the few conductors in the world who has conducted all of Mozart's German-language operas, and he joined the Juilliard Opera as Assistant Conductor for their production of Mozart's *Così fan tutte*.

His performance of Wagner's *Siegfried* was the first production of the work in Ohio in over a century. In recognition of his talent and entrepreneurialism, Musical America featured him as a Spotlight Artist. Committed to ensuring that music education is accessible to everyone, Isaac serves as a Cello Teaching Artist and conductor at the MYCincinnati Youth Orchestra, an El Sistema-inspired program in Cincinnati.

Isaac made his German debut conducting the Deutsche Kammerphilharmonie Bremen in the fall of 2018. He has also conducted performances with the Xiamen Philharmonic, the Dayton Philharmonic, the National Symphony of Guatemala, the Chelsea Symphony, and the Cincinnati Chamber Orchestra. He served as Assistant

Conductor for Cincinnati Opera and the Glimmerglass Festival, where he conducted the first-ever reading of the revised version of Philip Glass's *Appomattox*, with the composer present.

Isaac's conducting can also be heard on the soundtrack to the award-winning video game, Masquerada: Songs and Shadows. He started his professional music career at the age of 18 singing in the chorus of the Great Synagogue in Jerusalem, Israel. He holds a BA from Yale College, where he was principal cellist of the Yale Symphony and sang in Yale's Schola Cantorum. He completed an MM in conducting at Mannes College, where he won a competitive grant from the New School Green Fund to present a concert dealing with environmental advocacy. And he holds a doctorate from the University of Cincinnati-College Conservatory of Music, where his research focused on Mozart's use of the baritone voice. His scholarship on Weber's Der Freischütz was included in the 2019 edition of the Weberiana Journal of the Internationale Carl Maria von Weber-Gesellschaft. He has also contributed scholarship to publishers Bärenreiter, Henle, Schott, Breitkopf & Härtel, and the University of Chicago Press/Casa Ricordi in the critical editions of the works of Bach. Beethoven. Bizet, Mascagni, Mendelssohn, Stravinsky, Tchaikovsky, Verdi, Wagner, and Weber. To celebrate the 100th anniversary of the founding of the Bärenreiter publishing house, Isaac was honored to be a Jubilee Ambassador. He has received career grants from the Olgai Forrai Foundation and the Anna Sosenko Assist Trust.

Isaac maintains a catalogue of parallel fifths and other voice leading irregularities he finds in the works of common-practice composers. You can see them, as well as his commentary on counterpoint at his blog, illicitfifths tumbly com.

Isaac is based in Cincinnati with his wife Pin-Hsuan Chen, who is a violinist and personal trainer. They have three cats: Tosca, Aida, and Tamino. Isaac Selva

CICC consists of three treble voiced choirs of children and youth in 1st thru 9th grades.

PHILHARMONIC YOUTH ORCHESTRA

The Philharmonic Youth Orchestra (PYO) provides an encouraging and challenging orchestral setting for middle and high school students. PYO musicians are mentored by Philharmonic musicians and perform in several concerts and ensemble groups each year, including an opportunity to perform side-by-side with the Columbus Philharmonic Orchestra. Membership is by audition.









STRINGS CLASSES

The Philharmonic offers weekly strings classes in local elementary schools, with a concert presented at the end of each semester. Beginning, intermediate and advanced classes are offered.

SUMMER CAMPS

Choral Festival and Strings Camp are offered to young aspiring musicians during May and June. Choral Festival is a weekend music camp for childrengraduating intogrades 4-8. Participants enjoy singing, playing musical games, learning about vocal production, harmony, and much more! At Strings Camp, string musicians of all levels in grades 1-8 are encouraged to sign up for group lessons on violin, viola, cello, and bass taught by experienced instructors. Arts and crafts, swimming, miniature golf, and other outdoor fun are part of the daily schedule. Both camps culminate in performances open to the public.

M. Andrew Jones, tenor

Tenor M. Andrew Jones enchants audiences with his powerful vocal presence and unwavering passion. His artistry showcases the very essence of contemporary operatic excellence, earning accolades from critics and fellow artists alike.

In recent performances, his portrayal of Lenski in concert with Queen City Opera, mesmerized audiences with his "firm, heroic"



sound full of depth and emotion. Much acclaim has followed his portrayals of Max in *Der Freischütz* and Mime in *Siegfried* at Valhalla Productions in San Francisco, solidifying his reputation as a versatile and technically adept artist. Notable performances include Gulbrand in Queen City Opera's production of Undina by Tchaikovsky, Don Ottavio in *Don Giovanni*, Pedrillo in *Die Entführung* aus dem Serail with Queen City Opera, as well as roles such as the 1st Armored Man/Second Priest in *Die Zauberflöte* with Dayton Opera, The Messenger in *Aida*, and the Innkeeper in *Der Rosenkavalier* with Cincinnati Opera.

Furthering his commitment to the arts, Jones holds a Master's of Music in Vocal Performance from the University of Cincinnati - College Conservatory of Music, under the tutelage of the distinguished Kenneth Shaw, and a Bachelor of Arts in Music from Luther College, guided by the esteemed Ed Andereck.



K. Micheal Young, baritone

Mike Young, baritone, is an Ohio native based in Cincinnati. Mike performs a wide variety of repertoire, from Bach to Wagner, on the operatic and concert stages. Past performances with QCO include Alberich in Wagner's Siegfried, the title role in Mozart's Don Giovanni, the role of the water demon Struj in the world premiere reconstruction of Tchaikovsky's Undina, and Second Priest in Mozart's Super Flute.

His other recent operatic performances include Marcello in

Puccini's La Boheme, Scarpia in Puccini's Tosca, George Milton in Floyd's Of Mice and Men, Enrico in Donizetti's Lucia di Lammermoor, Baron Douphol in Verdi's La Traviata, and the titular roles in Verdi's Macbeth and Mozart's Don Giovanni. Concert performances include the title role of Mendelssohn's Elijah, Baritone Soloist in Orff's Carmina Burana, Beethoven's Ninth Symphony, Handel's Messiah, Haydn's Creation, Handel's Israel in Egypt, and Bach's B Minor Mass, Magnificat, Christmas Oratorio, St. Matthew Passion, and St. John Passion. In addition to his solo work, Mike is a member of The Bach Ensemble at St. Thomas, Collegium Cincinnati, and Coro Volante. Seemingly never content in a singular profession, Mike is a freelance graphic designer and social media marketer whose oeuvre can mainly be seen on beer cans throughout the Cincinnati metropolitan area.



Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

Brandenburg Concerto No. 4 in G Major, BWV 1049

Soloists:

Bach's *Brandenburg Concerto No. 4* is a virtuosic showcase for violin and two flutes, blending dazzling interplay with moments of exquisite lyricism. The work is part of Bach's collection of six concertos, each presenting a unique combination of instruments and textures.

The Brandenburg Concertos were composed around 1721 and dedicated to Christian Ludwig, the Margrave of Brandenburg. However, despite their brilliance, the concertos were largely overlooked during Bach's lifetime. It is unclear whether they were ever performed at the Margrave's court, and the manuscripts remained in obscurity for over a century. They were rediscovered in the 19th century and are now recognized as some of the finest examples of Baroque instrumental music.

The first movement is lively and intricate, with the two flutes weaving an almost conversational dialogue above the energetic string accompaniment. The slow movement shifts to a darker, more contemplative tone, allowing the violin to sing expressively over a gentle walking bass. The final movement, marked *Presto*, is a whirlwind of counterpoint and exuberance, culminating in an exhilarating conclusion.

This performance features choreography by Dancers Studio. addina interwoven a visual element to the musical lines. fresh dancers bring perspective Bach's music. a to highlighting rhythmic vitality its and expressive contours.

Michiru Yamane (b. 1963)

Woodcarving Partita from Castlevania: Symphony of the Night Arranged by Audrey Schmid (3 minutes)

Originally composed for *Castlevania: Symphony of the Night*, Michiru Yamane's *Woodcarving Partita* is a stunning homage to the Baroque style, blending harpsichord-like textures with hauntingly beautiful harmonies. The piece underscores the gothic elegance of *Symphony of the Night*, a game that itself draws heavily on themes of myth and legend.

Michiru Yamane is a Japanese composer best known for her work on the *Castlevania* series, where she developed a signature sound that blends classical, Baroque, and gothic influences with modern game music aesthetics. Born in Kagawa, Japan, she studied composition at the Aichi Prefectural University of Fine Arts and Music before joining Konami in 1988. Her first major success came with *Nemesis 3: The Eve of Destruction* (1989), but it was her work on *Castlevania: Bloodlines* (1994) and *Symphony of the Night* (1997) that cemented her status as one of the most influential composers in video game music.

Castlevania is one of the most iconic video game franchises in history, blending gothic horror, action, and exploration with a strong musical identity. First released by Konami in 1986, the series follows vampire hunters—most often members of the Belmont clan—as they battle the evil forces of Dracula and his monstrous minions. The series is known for its challenging gameplay, intricate level design, and atmospheric storytelling, drawing inspiration from classic horror literature and films.


Among its many installments, *Castlevania: Symphony of the Night* (1997) stands as one of the most celebrated. Considered a revolutionary title in gaming history, SOTN introduced nonlinear exploration, and a vast interconnected world—gameplay mechanics that would later influence the "Metroidvania" genre. In this entry, players take on the role of Alucard, Dracula's half-human son, who must navigate the sprawling halls of his father's castle to prevent his resurrection.

Beyond its gameplay innovations, *Symphony of the Night* is particularly renowned for its lush, genre-defying soundtrack, which blends Baroque and Romantic classical styles with jazz, rock, and electronic elements—a hallmark of composer Michiru Yamane's signature style.

Her compositions often showcase a deep appreciation for classical and romantic-era music, blending virtuosic keyboard textures, lush string orchestrations, and haunting choral passages. *Woodcarving Partita* is one of her most beloved pieces, demonstrating her ability to integrate centuries-old musical traditions into a contemporary setting.

Bach's *Coffee Cantata* is a delightful, comedic miniature opera disguised as a secular cantata. Originally composed in the 1730s, it humorously depicts the conflict between a father, Schlendrian, and his coffee-obsessed daughter, Liesgen. The work was originally performed at Zimmerman's Coffee House in Leipzig, where Bach often presented secular works for a more casual audience.

In this production, Liesgen's addiction has been updated—not to coffee in general, but to **ultra-convenient, environmentally harmful coffee preparation methods** such as disposable pods. Her father, Schlendrian, is a devoted advocate of **French press coffee**, arguing for its superior taste, lower environmental impact, and authenticity. Liesgen, initially dismissive, sings passionately about her love for the instant gratification of single-use coffee pods, but through a series of negotiations (and threats about withholding parental financial support), she ultimately agrees to try the French press method.

The music is among Bach's most charming and playful, featuring lively arias and witty exchanges between father and daughter. The cantata concludes with a celebratory chorus, reimagined here as a hymn to the virtues of sustainable brewing methods.



The pre-concert presentation by Richard McCoy of the Landmark Foundation Columbus will highlight the architectural connections between Columbus, Indiana, and Japan, with a particular focus on Miyoshi, Columbus' sister city. Just as music can foster unity across cultures, so too can architecture reflect a shared vision of innovation, craftsmanship, and harmony between tradition and modernity.

Junichi Masuda (b. 1968)

Pokémon Medley: 6 minutes

Junichi Masuda is one of the defining voices of video game music, particularly through his work on the *Pokémon* series. For audiences unfamiliar with *Pokémon*, it is one of the most successful and influential entertainment franchises in the world. Created by Satoshi Tajiri and launched in 1996, the franchise began as a roleplaying video game for Nintendo's Game Boy before expanding into an extensive media empire that includes animated series, trading card games, movies, and a vast array of merchandise.

At its core, *Pokémon* (a portmanteau of "Pocket Monsters") is about adventure, strategy, and friendship, as players take on the role of Pokémon Trainers who travel across fictional worlds, capturing and training creatures called Pokémon to battle against one another. The franchise's enduring appeal stems from its themes of discovery, personal growth, and companionship, making it beloved by generations of players around the globe.

As a composer, director, and producer, Masuda's music has shaped the experiences of millions of players worldwide. Born in Yokohama, Japan, in 1968, Masuda studied computer programming and music composition, combining these two disciplines in his work at Game Freak, the studio that developed Pokémon. His compositions, often inspired by traditional Japanese scales and Western harmonies, create a sense of adventure, wonder, and discovery, orchestral medley brings together some of the recognizable themes from Pokémon, evoking the spirit exploration and camaraderie that defines the beloved franchise. Beethoven's Ninth. Pokémon has become cultural phenomenon. transcending borders and generations.

Nobuo Uematsu (b. 1959)

One-Winged Angel from Final Fantasy VII (7 minutes)

Nobuo Uematsu is one of the most celebrated composers in the history of video game music. Born in Kochi, Japan, in 1959, Uematsu was largely self-taught as a musician, drawing inspiration from a wide range of influences, including classical music, progressive rock, film scores, and traditional Japanese melodies. He began his career at Square (later Square Enix) in the mid-1980s and quickly became the musical voice of the *Final Fantasy* series, composing for the franchise from its first installment in 1987 through *Final Fantasy IX* (2000) and later returning for select works in the series.

Uematsu's signature style blends orchestral grandeur with memorable, emotionally evocative melodies, allowing his music to stand independently of the games. His compositions, particularly those from *Final Fantasy*, have been adapted for symphony orchestras, sold out concert halls worldwide, and gained recognition as some of the most significant works in game music.

Few pieces of video game music have reached the legendary status of *One-Winged Angel*, the climactic battle theme from *Final Fantasy VII*. Nobuo Uematsu, often called "the Beethoven of video game music," drew inspiration from Gustav Holst's *Mars*, the Bringer of War and Carl Orff's Carmina Burana to create an epic choral-orchestral showdown.

Released in 1997, Final Fantasy VII is one of the most influential and beloved role-playing games of all time. The game is set on a planet suffering from environmental collapse due to Shinra Corporation, a powerful energy company that extracts Mako, the planet's life force, for industrial use. This reckless exploitation threatens to destroy the planet, setting the stage for a struggle between corporate greed and ecological survival.

The story follows Cloud Strife, a former elite Shinra soldier turned mercenary, who joins a rebel group called AVALANCHE to fight against

Shinra's destructive practices. However, Cloud's past is deeply intertwined with Sephiroth, a legendary warrior thought to be dead. As the game unfolds, Sephiroth emerges as the primary antagonist, seeking to harness the planet's energy for his own ascension, ultimately attempting to become a god-like being.

The narrative of *Final Fantasy VII* explores themes of identity, memory, environmentalism, and the consequences of unchecked corporate power, making it one of the most critically acclaimed and emotionally resonant video games ever created.

This piece is unique in video game history for its use of a Latin-texted chorus, adding a sense of apocalyptic grandeur to the battle against the game's iconic villain, Sephiroth. Its driving rhythms, aggressive orchestration, and operatic drama make it a natural fit alongside Beethoven's *Ninth Symphony*, reinforcing the idea that music—whether from the 18th century or a 1997 video game—can convey the most profound struggles and triumphs of the human spirit.

Beethoven's *Symphony No.* 9 is a monument to the universal power of music, bringing together voices and instruments in a triumphant declaration of human unity. The symphony's final movement, featuring Friedrich Schiller's *Ode to Joy*, is one of the most famous and widely recognized melodies in the world, symbolizing brotherhood and peace. Leonard Bernstein conducted a performance in Berlin at the Fall of the Berlin Wall in 1989.

Ludwig van Beethoven is often portrayed as the quintessential romantic hero, a figure of unyielding artistic vision who overcame extraordinary adversity. Born in Bonn, Germany, in 1770, he displayed prodigious musical talent from a young age and was trained by Christian Gottlob Neefe, who introduced him to the works of Johann Sebastian Bach. Beethoven later moved to Vienna in 1792, where he studied with Joseph Haydn and established himself as one of the most remarkable pianists and composers of his time.

However, by his late twenties, Beethoven began experiencing progressive hearing loss, a devastating condition for a musician. By the time he composed the Ninth Symphony, he was almost completely deaf. His despair over his worsening condition is painfully documented in the Heiligenstadt Testament (1802), a letter in which he expressed his anguish and considered ending his life. Yet, he resolved to continue composing, and his later works—including the Eroica Symphony (No. 3), the Hammerklavier Sonata, and the late string quartets—became some of the most profound and revolutionary in classical music.

Beethoven had long contemplated setting Friedrich Schiller's 1785 poem *An die Freude (Ode to Joy)* to music, but the path to realizing the Ninth Symphony was arduous. It took him over three decades from his first sketches to the work's completion in 1824.

The composition process was fraught with difficulties:

- » He struggled with the monumental task of integrating a choral finale into a symphony, something never done before on this scale.
- » His declining health, increasing isolation, and personal conflicts with patrons and publishers made his working conditions difficult.
- » The symphony's sheer complexity pushed the limits of orchestral and vocal writing, requiring a level of endurance and precision that was unprecedented at the time.

The world premiere of the Ninth Symphony took place on May 7, 1824, in Vienna at the Kärntnertor Theater. Beethoven himself was present, though he could no longer hear the music. The performance was met with standing ovations, but the process leading up to it was far from smooth:

- » Rehearsals were chaotic, as the work was considered nearly unplayable by contemporary musicians. Some instrumentalists struggled with the extreme technical demands, especially in the scherzo and finale.
- » The singers faced immense

challenges, particularly in the choral finale, where Beethoven's demanding vocal writing pushed voices to their limits. The soprano and tenor parts were notorious for their difficulty.

» Beethoven was unable to hear the audience's response. After the final notes, he continued conducting, unaware that the music had ended, until Caroline Unger, one of the soloists, gently turned him around to see the ecstatic applause from the crowd.

Despite these difficulties, the Ninth Symphony cemented Beethoven's legacy as a composer who pushed the boundaries of what was possible in music.



In Japan, Dai-ku (literally "The Big 9") has become a beloved New Year's Eve tradition, performed by massive choirs and orchestras in stadiums across the country. The tradition began in the early 20th century, when German prisoners of war interned in Japan during World War I introduced the symphony. Since then, it has taken on a life of its own, with performances often featuring choirs of 10,000 or more voices.

Like the architectural connections between Columbus, Indiana, and Miyoshi, Japan, Beethoven's Ninth serves as a cultural bridge, uniting people across language and geography. Its closing lines—"All people become brothers!"—resonate deeply in a world seeking harmony and understanding.

Caio has completed the coursework for the Doctor of Music degree at the Jacobs School of Music, where he also earned his Master of Music degree. He received his Bachelor of Music degree from São Paulo State University in Brazil.



Prince Siegfried is celebrating his birthday with his friends and peasants. The revelries are interrupted by his mother, the Queen, who is concerned about his carefree lifestyle. She tells him that he must choose a bride at the royal ball the following evening. He is upset that he cannot marry for love. His friend, Benno, and the Jester try to lift his troubled mood. As evening falls, Benno sees a flock of swans flying overhead and suggests they go on a hunt. Siegfried and his friends take their crossbows and set off in pursuit of the swans.

- ACT 2

Siegfried has become separated from his friends. He arrives at the lakeside clearing, just as a flock of swans land. He aims his crossbow, but freezes when one of them transforms into a beautiful maiden named Odette. At first, she is terrified of him. When he promises not to harm her, she explains that she and her companions are victims of a spell cast by the evil owl-like sorcerer named Rothbart. By day they are turned into swans and only at night, by the side of the enchanted lake do they return to human form. The spell can only be broken if one who has never loved before swears to love Odette forever. Rothbart suddenly appears. Siegfried threatens to kill him but Odette intercedes – if Rothbart dies before the spell is broken, it can never be undone.

As Rothbart disappears, the swan maidens fill the clearing. Siegfried breaks his crossbow, and sets about winning Odette's trust as they fall in love. But as dawn arrives, the evil spell draws Odette and her companions back to the lake and they are turned into swans again.

- ACT 3 -

Guests arrive at the palace for a costume ball. Four princesses are presented to the prince as candidates for marriage. Rothbart arrives with his daughter, Odile, who is transformed to look like Odette. Though the princesses try to attract Siegfried with their dances, he has eyes only for Odile. Odette appears at the castle window and attempts to warn him, but he does not see her. He then proclaims to the court that he will marry Odile before Rothbart shows him a magical vision of Odette. Grief-stricken and realizing his mistake (he vowed only to love Odette), he hurries back to the lake.

- ACT 4 ·

Odette is distraught. The swan maidens try to comfort her. Siegfried returns to the lake and makes a passionate apology. She forgives him, but his betrayal cannot be undone. Rather than remain a swan forever, she chooses to die. He chooses to save her and they leap into the lake. This breaks Rothbart's spell over the swan maidens, causing him to lose his power over them and he dies. In an apotheosis, they, who transform back into regular maidens, watch as Siegfried and Odette ascend from the lake, forever united in love.






